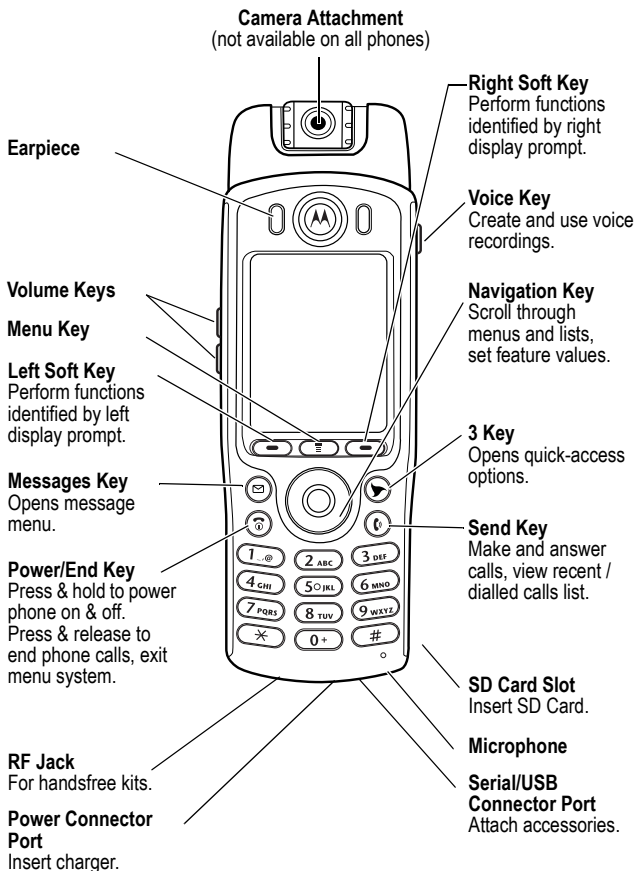

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



The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information contained in user guides published prior to October 2002.

This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) this device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

RF Operational Characteristics

Your Personal Communicator contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) energy.

When you communicate with your Personal Communicator, the system handling your call controls the power levels at which your personal communicator transmits.

Exposure To Radio Frequency Energy

Your Motorola Personal Communicator is designed to comply with the following national and international standards and guidelines regarding exposure of human beings to radio frequency energy:

- Australian Communications Authority Radiocommunications (Electromagnetic Radiation - Human Exposure) Standard 1999 (applicable to wireless phones only)

To assure optimal performance and make sure human exposure to radio frequency energy is within the guidelines set forth in the above standards, always adhere to the following procedures:

Portable Personal Communicator Operation and Radio Frequency Energy Exposure

Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the Personal Communicator and may violate FCC and/or other applicable regulations and standards.

DO NOT hold the antenna when the Personal Communicator is "IN USE". Holding the antenna affects call quality and may cause the Personal Communicator to operate at a higher power level than needed.

Phone Operation

The Personal Communicator is designed to be used with a headset for talking and listening. The Personal Communicator can also be placed inside the holster, then the holster can be clipped onto your belt, pocket, handbag, or other apparel and used with the headset.

Body-worn Operation

To maintain compliance with FCC and/or other applicable regulations and standards, if you wear the Personal Communicator on your body when transmitting, always place the Personal Communicator in a Motorola supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this product. Use of non-Motorola-approved accessories may exceed FCC and/or other applicable regulations and standards. If you do not use one of the Motorola-supplied or approved body-worn accessories, and you are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least one inch (2.5 cm) from your body when transmitting.

Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least one inch (2.5 centimeters) from the body.

Electromagnetic Interference/Compatibility

Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to electromagnetic interference (EMI) if inadequately shielded, designed or otherwise configured for electromagnetic compatibility.

Facilities

To avoid electromagnetic interference and/or compatibility conflicts, turn off your Personal Communicator in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your Personal Communicator when on board an aircraft. Any use of a Personal Communicator must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

Medical Devices

Pacemakers

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of 6 inches (15 centimeters) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by, and recommendations of, the United States Food and Drug Administration.

Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the Personal Communicator more than six inches (15 centimeters) from their pacemaker when the Personal Communicator is turned ON.
- not carry the Personal Communicator in the breast pocket.
- use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- turn the Personal Communicator OFF immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Safety and General

Use in Vehicles

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in your vehicle. Always obey them.

When using your Personal Communicator in a vehicle, please:

- Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call.

Operational Warnings

For Vehicles with an Air Bag

Do not place the Personal Communicator in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If the Personal Communicator is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the Personal Communicator may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your Personal Communicator prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, unless it is especially qualified for use in such areas as “Intrinsically Safe” (for example, Factory Mutual, CSA, or UL Approved). Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fueling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, and areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn off your Personal Communicator when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted: “Turn off two-way radio”. Obey all signs and instructions.

Operational Cautions

Antennas

Do not use any Personal Communicator that has a damaged antenna. If a damaged antenna comes into contact with your skin, a minor burn can result.

Batteries

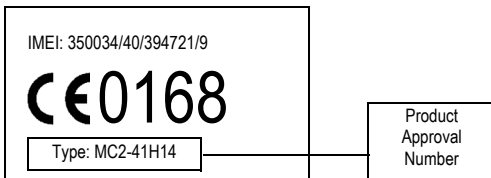
All batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewelry, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. Exercise care in handling any charged battery, particularly when placing it inside a pocket, purse, or other container with metal objects.

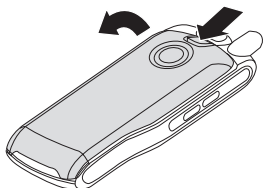

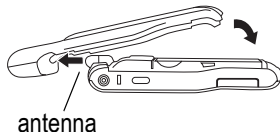

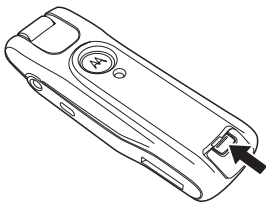
- 1 If necessary, push down the battery door release latch and lift the door off the phone.



- 2 Replace the battery door with the camera accessory, inserting the phone's antenna into its hole.



- 3 Slide the camera latch closed to secure the camera in place.



Installing the SIM Card

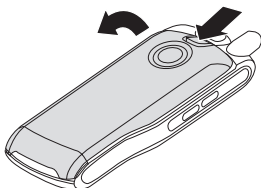
Your SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory. Your phone can use GSM SIM cards, but not all features will be available.

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.

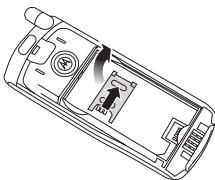

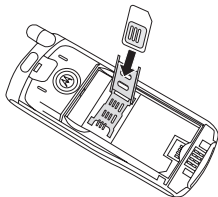

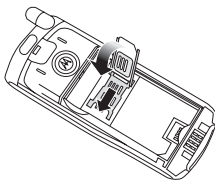
- 2 Slide the SIM card door down and lift open.



- 3 Insert the SIM card into the SIM card tray with the notch in the lower left corner and the gold plate facing down.



- 4 Close the SIM card door and slide it up to lock the SIM card in place.



Installing the Battery

You must install and charge the battery to use your phone.



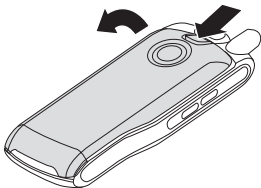
Caution: Your phone is designed to be used only with Motorola Original batteries and accessories. We recommend that you store batteries in their protective cases when not in use.

If your camera is installed, you need to remove it to access your battery. See “Reinstalling the Camera” on page 16.

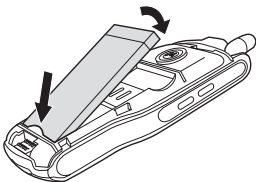

- 1 Remove the battery from its protective clear plastic case.

- 2 If necessary, push down the battery door release latch and lift the door off the phone.

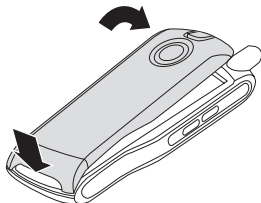


- 3 Insert the battery, printed arrow first, **under the tab** at the bottom of the battery compartment and press the top of the battery into place.



Do This

- 4 Insert the hooks at the bottom of the battery door into the base of the phone, then push the door on to snap it into place.

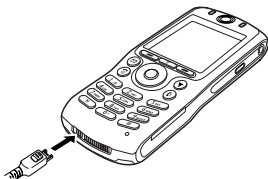


Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery, as indicated by the following instructions. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

Do This

- 1 Plug the travel charger into your phone with the release tab facing up.



-
- 2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.
 - 3 When your phone indicates that the battery is fully charged (**Charge Complete**), press the release tab and remove the travel charger.

Note: When you charge the battery, the battery level indicator in the upper right corner of the display shows how much of the charging process is complete.

Battery Use

Battery performance depends on many factors, including 3s network configuration; signal strength; the temperature at which you operate your phone; the features and/or settings you select and use; and your voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Battery Care

Caution: To prevent injuries or burns, do not allow metal objects to contact or short-circuit the battery terminals.

To maximise your battery's performance:

- Always use Motorola Original™ batteries and battery chargers. The phone warranty does not cover damage caused from using non-Motorola batteries and/or battery chargers.
- New batteries or batteries that have been stored for long periods of time may require a longer charge time.
- Maintain the battery at or near room temperature when charging.
- Do not expose batteries to temperatures below -10°C (14°F) or above 45°C (113°F). Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When you do not intend to use a battery for a while, store it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Over extended periods of time, batteries gradually wear down and require longer charging times. This is normal. If you charge your battery regularly and notice a decrease in talk time or an increase in charging time, then it is probably time to purchase a new battery.



The rechargeable batteries that power this product must be disposed of properly and may need to be recycled. Refer to your battery's label for battery type. Contact your local recycling centre for proper disposal methods. Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

Extending Battery Life

- **Turn off your display backlight**
The backlight uses power. To turn it off, see page 30.
- **Turn off the screen saver**
Using an animated screen saver reduces your phone's talk and standby time. To turn it off, see page 56.
- **Use the display timeout**
You can tell your phone display to turn off when you are not using it. See page 58.
- **Avoid keypad-intense functions**
Activities that require intensive keystroke use (such as playing a game or using messaging) reduce your phone's talk and standby time.
- **Avoid the Vibrate ring setting**
Your phone's **Vibrate** ring setting uses more power than a standard ring sound or the **Silent** setting.

Adjusting Volume

Press the upper and lower volume keys to:

- increase and decrease earpiece or speakerphone volume during a call
- increase and decrease the ringer volume setting when the idle display is visible
- turn off an incoming call alert

Making and Answering Calls

Making a Call

To call a number, your phone must:

- be turned on with the phone and keypad unlocked
- have a SIM card inserted and unlocked
- have a network connection with adequate signal strength

dial the phone number (up to 32 digits)

Tip: If you make a mistake, press **DELETE** (☒) to delete the last digit, or press and hold **DELETE** (☒) to clear all digits.

2 (☎) (send key)

make the call

3 (☎) (end key)

end the call when it is done

Note: You can make an emergency call even when the phone is locked, or when a SIM card is not inserted. See “Dialling an Emergency Number” on page 35.

Answering a Call

To answer a call, your phone must:

- be turned on with the phone unlocked
- have a SIM card inserted and unlocked
- have a network connection with adequate signal strength

When you receive a call, your phone rings and/or vibrates and displays an incoming call message.

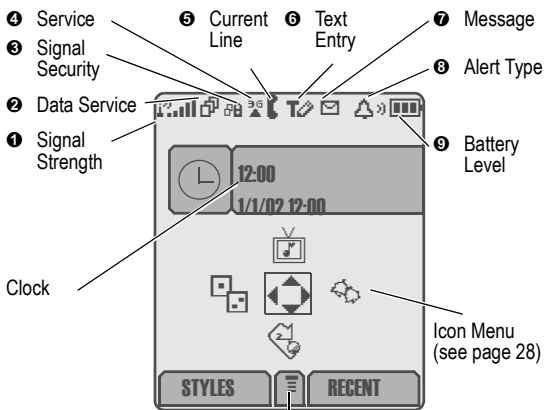

Using Your Phone

Display Symbols



When the Menu Indicator (☰) appears, you can press (☷) to open a menu. See "Using the Menu" on page 28.

1 Signal Strength Indicator Shows the strength of your phone's connection with the network.

Strong  No signal

You cannot make or answer calls when the "no signal" indicator is displayed.



2 Data Service Indicator Indicates when a packet data connection is available. This type of connection can allow faster data transfer speeds.

3 Signal Security Indicator Indicates when you have a secure connection for packet data transfers, embedded application connections, or circuit switch data calls.



4 Service Indicator Indicates when your phone uses your home network (📶) or another network (🌐). When you leave your home network area, your phone *roams* or seeks another network.

5 Current Line Indicator Tells you when you have Voice Privacy on, a call in progress, or Call Diverting on. This icon also tells you which line is active (if you have a call on hold), and whether you have Caps Lock, Numeric Entry, or Symbol Entry switched on (when entering text).

6 Text Entry Indicator Indicates your Text Entry Method whenever you are in a text editor (Tap, iTap, etc.). See “Entering and Editing Text” on page 30.



7 Message Indicator Indicates when you have a new voice or text message waiting.

8 Alert Type Indicator Shows the current selected alert profile. The default alert setting is a ringer.

🔔 = loud ring

🔔 = soft ring

🔔 = vibrate

🔔 = ring and vibrate

🔔 = silent

Battery Level Indicator Shows the amount of charge left in your battery. The more bars visible, the greater the charge.

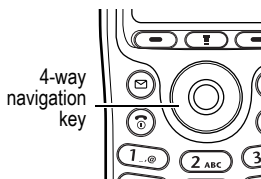
High     Empty

Recharge your battery as soon as possible when you see the **Low Battery** warning message and hear the low battery alert.

Note: When you charge the battery, the battery level indicator instead shows how much of the charging process is complete. See “Charging the Battery” on page 20.

Using the 4-Way Navigation Key

Use the 4-way navigation keys like a joystick to navigate the menu system, change feature settings, and play games.



Tip: Down and up are your primary movements within menus. Move left and right to change feature settings, navigate the calendar, and edit text.

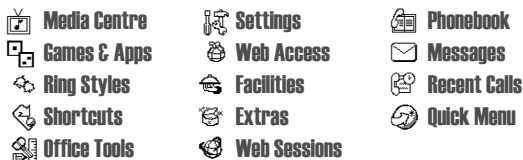
Using the Message and 3 Keys

Your phone has special keys that give you access to important features. Your Messages key (✉) instantly opens your messages, while your 3 key (3) opens a menu of 3 services. Press ⬆ up and down to choose the service you want, then press **SELECT**. To get back to this menu when you are in a service, just press ⬇. To close it, press ⬆.





Using the Menu

Using the Icon Menu

When your phone is idle, it displays four easy-access icons. The following icons may appear.

Press  up to select the icon on the top, press  left to select the icon on the left, and so on. You can also press the right or left soft keys ( ) to select the program named in the display just above the key.

Choosing Alert and Ring Tones

Your phone rings or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call, message, or other event. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*. The alert setting indicator in your display shows the current alert profile (see illustration on page 25).

Customise an Alert Profile

Tip: This feature lets you set the profile's ringer volume and keypad volume.

Setting Your Backlight

You can set the amount of time that the display backlight remains on, or turn off the backlight to conserve battery power:

You can turn animation off (to conserve the battery) or on. Animation makes your phone's menus move smoothly as you scroll up and down.

Entering and Editing Text

Various text entry methods make it easy for you to enter names, numbers, and text messages on your phone.

Choosing a Text Mode

To activate a text mode, press  from any text entry screen and select the text mode from the **Entry Method** menu:

| ITAP | Let the phone predict each word as you enter it, then choose the word from a list. |
| Numeric | Enter only the number that appears on each key. |
| Symbol | Enter symbols only. |

Tap

Enter characters one at a time by pressing the key for the letter, number, or symbol. This is the standard mode for entering text on your phone.

Note: The text mode you select remains active until you change it by selecting another mode.








General Text Entry Rules

Use the keypad to enter letters, numbers, symbols, and other characters with the tap method. Press the same key repeatedly to cycle through available characters. (See the “Character Chart” on page 31.)

- If you do not press a key for two seconds, the character in the block cursor is accepted, and the cursor moves to the next position.
- The first character of each sentence is capitalised unless you manually change it. (Press  down to force the character to lowercase while it is highlighted by the block cursor.)

Copying, Cutting, and Pasting Text

You can copy, cut, and paste characters in the text and number editors.

In an editor, press  to see the following options:

Option	Description
Copy Text	tells your phone to copy the text you are about to highlight (see “Highlighting Text” below)
Copy All Text	copies all text in the editor
Cut Text	tells your phone to cut the text you are about to highlight (see “Highlighting Text” below)
Cut All Text	cuts all text in the editor
Paste	pastes the text you cut or copied
Undo	undoes the last copy, cut, or paste action in the current text editor

Note: The **Copy All Text** option also appears in the menu (press ) when you are viewing details for a Phonebook entry, Calendar event, Browser page, Text Message, or Recent Calls entry.

Text remains on your clipboard, available to paste, until you copy or cut other text or until you turn off your phone.

Redialling a Number


You can redial a previously dialled phone number, whether the call was connected or busy. From the idle display:

Press	To
1 	go directly to the dialled calls list
2 	scroll to the entry you want to call
3 	redial the highlighted number

Using Caller ID



The *calling line identification* (caller ID) feature lets you see who is calling before you answer. If the caller's name is stored in your phonebook, the phone automatically displays the **Name**.


- If caller ID information is not available, your phone displays the message **Incoming Call**.
- While dialling (with digits visible in the display), Press  > **Hide ID/Show ID** to Hide (or show) your caller ID for the next call

Dialling an Emergency Number

3 may program one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 999, that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted. **3** can program additional emergency numbers into your SIM card. *However, your SIM card must be inserted in your phone in order to use the numbers stored on it.* See **3** for additional information on this issue.


Note: *Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's preprogrammed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.*

To call the emergency number at any time:

Press	To
1 keypad keys	dial the emergency number (such as 999)
2 	call the emergency number

Inserting Special Characters into Dialling Sequences

While dialling (with digits visible in the display):

<p>Press  and then scroll to and select one of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Insert Pause (to insert a p)• Insert Wait (to insert a w)• Insert 'n' (to insert an n)	<p>insert a special character when making a call that requires you to enter additional digits (for example, to make a calling card call, or to retrieve messages from an answering machine):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Pause tells your phone to wait until the call connects before it automatically dials the next digit(s) in a series.• Wait tells your phone to wait until the call connects, and then to prompt you for confirmation before it dials the next digit(s).• 'n' tells your phone to prompt you for a number before dialling the call. The number you enter is inserted into the dialling sequence in place of the n character.

Using Voicemail



Text messages are brief messages that you can send and receive (such as **Where are we meeting?**). Received messages appear on your phone display or in your text message inbox.

Note: 3 has already programmed the text message inbox settings for you.

Creating and Sending Messages

You can create and send a message to one or more recipients. The message feature lets you manually enter each recipient's phone number, or select one or more numbers from the phonebook or recent calls lists. You can also send a message to a Mailing List containing multiple addresses (see "Storing a Phonebook Entry" on page 48 to create a Mailing List).

There are four different types of messages: **Short Message**, **Email**, **Letter**, and **Postcard**. For a description of the items in each message type, see "Message Contents" on page 44.



In the fixed dial list, you can create, edit, delete, and sort entries just like in the phonebook list. Fixed dial list entries are stored on your SIM card and do not have **Type** or **Voice Name** fields.

Monitoring Phone Use

Your phone tracks and records call times. Use the recent calls menu to view and reset a call timer.

Network connection time is the elapsed time from the moment you connect to the network to the moment you end the call by pressing . This time includes busy signals and ringing.

The amount of network connection time you track on your resettable timer may not equal the amount of time for which you are billed by 3. For billing information, please contact 3 directly.

You can view the approximate network connection time elapsed during the following calls:

Timer	Description
Last Call	Time spent on the last call dialed or received. You cannot reset this timer.
Dialed Calls	Total time spent on dialed calls since the last time you reset this timer.
Received Calls	Total time spent on calls received since the last time you reset this timer.
All Calls	Total time spent on dialed and received calls since the last time you reset this timer.
Lifetime	Total time spent on all calls on this phone. You cannot reset this timer.

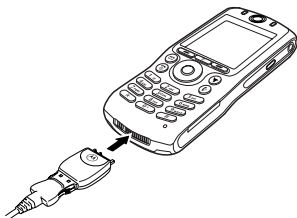

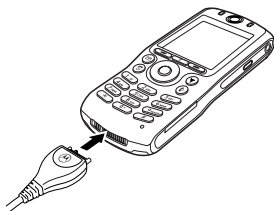

Data and Fax Calls



A Motorola Original™ data kit with a cable or a Bluetooth™ wireless connection lets you transfer data between your phone and a computer or other external device. You can:

- use your phone as a modem to connect to the Internet.
- use your phone to make and answer data and fax calls on your computer or hand-held device.

Using Sync

This feature lets you quickly synchronise your events and Phonebook entries with a local computer, or with an Internet server using a wireless connection.

Creating an Internet Sync Partner

Using an Internet Sync Partner

To start synchronising with a Sync partner:

Your phone attempts a Sync connection with the URL, user name, and password you entered for the partner. This might take several minutes, if there are many entries to synchronise.

To use Sync with a local partner such as a connected desktop computer, you must install Starfish TrueSync® software, a Motorola accessory product. See the TrueSync user guide for more information.

Note: *TrueSync software is designed to synchronise with basic features of many popular Personal Information Management (PIM) software and hardware products.*

Using an SD or MMC Card

You can purchase Secure Digital or Multimedia Cards to store or load large files such as videos, pictures, or sound.





To Insert a Card

- 1 Insert the card in the slot in the side of your phone (see the diagram on page 1). Insert the narrow side with the cut corner first, with the exposed pins facing the back of the phone. Insert the card until it clicks in place.

To Insert a Card

- 2 Your phone should display the card contents or (if new) ask you to format it. If it does not, select  > **Settings** > **Phone Status** > *card name*

To store an item on your card, open it and press **STORE** () , if available, or press  > **Store**. You can store the file only, or make it a setting on your phone (such as ring tone or wallpaper).

To remove a card, push it in to trigger the release spring that ejects the card. The phone should push the card out enough that you can grab it and pull it the rest of the way out of the phone.

Security

Line Security

If your phone displays **Line Not Secure** while you are on a call, your phone has detected another device monitoring the call. This message does not appear when caller ID, call cost, or other information fills the display.

Locking and Unlocking Your Phone

A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, *but you must unlock it to answer.*

Lock Your Phone Manually

> **Phone Lock** > **Lock Now**

Set Your Phone to Lock Automatically

You can set your phone to lock every time you turn it off:

Changing Your Unlock Code

Your phone's four-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the six-digit security code is originally set to 000000.

We recommend that you change them to prevent other users from accessing your personal information or modifying your phone settings. The unlock code must contain four digits, and the security code must contain six digits. Be sure to make a note of the new numbers.
